African American History Month

Celebrate African American History Month with a wide variety of events for every age at your Milwaukee Public Library.

Meet historian **Mark Speltz**, author of *North of Dixie: Civil Rights Photography Beyond the South* on **Tuesday, February 7, 6-7 p.m.** at Washington Park. Speltz shines a light past the most iconic photographs of the era to focus on images of everyday activists who led grassroots campaigns to protest racial discrimination.

Join the opening celebration of an **African American History Museum** created in collaboration with neighborhood children and Villard Square area schools on **Monday, February 6, 5:30-7 p.m.** at Villard Square. The museum will be open February 6-28.

Celebrate the achievements of **African and African-American Inventors** and learn about becoming an inventor yourself February 7, 5-6 p.m. at Center Street, February 11, 2-3 p.m. at Mill Road, or February 28, 5-6 p.m. at Central.

Gather with family and friends at the **Black History Month Read-In** presented by Ald. Milele A. Coggs and library staff on **Wednesday, February 22, 5:30-7 p.m.** at Martin Luther King.

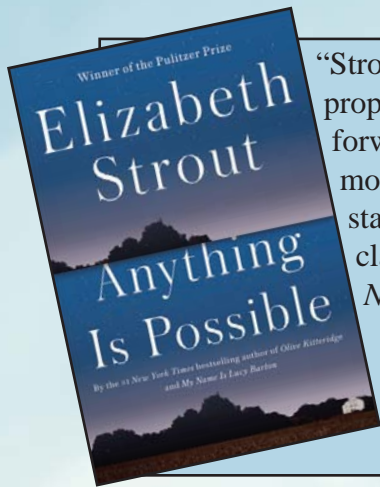

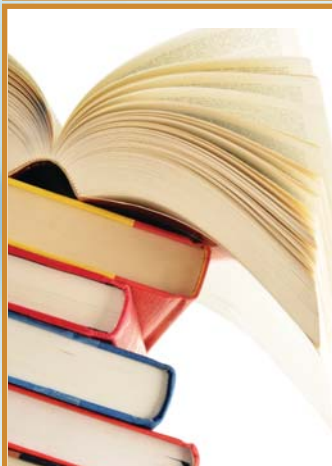
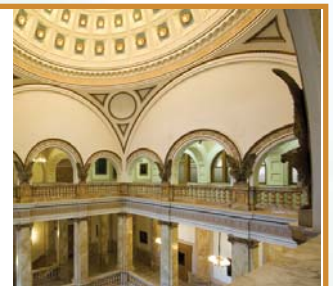

THE BOOKSHELF



The Dry by Jane Harper. Mystery. Agent Aaron Falk is summoned to a funeral by the father of his former best friend. Luke went on a tear and murdered his wife, son and self. His father wants Aaron to look into the situation in a town that has long-held secrets that may best remain hidden.



The Bear and the Nightingale by Katherine Arden. Science Fiction/Fantasy. Pytor receives a necklace from a stranger at the birth of his daughter, Vasya. When mysterious forces threaten their Russian village, Vasya discovers that, armed only with the necklace, she may be the only one who can keep the darkness at bay.



Heartstone by Elle Katharine White. Science Fiction/Fantasy. *Pride and Prejudice* — and dragons. Merrybourne Manor has a gryphon infestation and contracts with a band of Riders, skilled warriors with magical animal mounts, to kill them. The main Rider is a little self-important, and our heroine has a long memory.



The Girl Before by J. P. Delaney. Mystery. Seizing an exclusive opportunity to rent a one-of-a-kind, high-tech house, a damaged young woman falls in love with the enigmatic architect of the house, unaware she is following in the footsteps of a doomed former tenant. Chapters alternate between Emma, the 'girl before' and Jane, the 'girl now,' leaving readers in constant suspense.



The Fifth Petal by Brunonia Barry. Fiction. When a teenage boy dies suspiciously on Halloween, chief of police John Rafferty suspects it may be linked to the triple homicide twenty-five years earlier that involved three descendants of Salem Witch Trial victims.



Behind Her Eyes by Sarah Pinborough. Mystery. In this entrancing thriller, Louise and David meet in a bar, but when he confesses he's married, they go their separate ways — until Louise finds out David is the new psychiatrist hired by the practice where she works. Adele is trying to keep her marriage alive, but David has tired of her lies. When Adele befriends Louise, the triangle is complete.



The Second Mrs. Hockaday by Susan Rivers. Fiction. Letters, journal entries and court documents tell the story of Placidia who, at age 17, marries Major Hockaday, a recent widower with a child. He is recalled to service in the Civil War and she is left to manage the farm and care for his son. When he returns, he finds Placidia has had another child and is accused of adultery and murder.



The Most Dangerous Place on Earth by Lindsey Lee Johnson. Fiction. Not for the faint of heart! In a wealthy California community, the story opens with the suicide of a middle school boy — an outcast. New teacher Molly is devastated, and at the same time fascinated, with the lives of her privileged students. Fast forward to high school, where both teens and adults fight through life's usual issues, leaving no one untouched by tragedy.



Her Every Fear by Peter Swanson. Mystery. Kate Priddy is moving to Boston to swap apartments with her cousin, leaving behind life with an abusive ex. But when her neighbor is murdered, she's pulled into an even darker situation. Prone to panic attacks, Kate constantly imagines the worst case scenario — and now reality is far more dangerous than anything of which she could conceive.
