President Michele Bria called the meeting of the Milwaukee Public Library Board of Trustees to order at 4:01 p.m. on March 23, 2021 with a quorum present. All Trustees participated by video conference.

CONSENT AGENDA

1. Regular Board Meeting Minutes January 26, 2021.

President Bria asked the Board if any items should be removed from the Consent Agenda presented as Attachment A, pages 4-20 of the agenda. Hearing no objection, the Consent Agenda was approved.

SPECIAL COMMUNICATION

4. <u>Budget Outlook</u>. President Bria introduced Budget and Policy Manager Dennis Yaccarino to present the outlook for the 2022 budget. The City is preparing for a substantial budget crisis in 2023 due to increased pension payments. In 2021 the City will receive additional federal funds as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic which may help offset the deficit. MPL will be asked to submit a cost to continue budget for 2022 and no changes to hours or services are expected. Library Director Joan Johnson noted MPL priorities are maintaining hours and locations, continuing

infrastructure and capital projects, offering programming focused on literacy and youth-serving programs, digital inclusion, and the action plan for racial equity and inclusion. MPL is also researching options for expanded broadband access through the American Rescue Plan Act. Additional information about this initiative will be presented at the April 14, 2021 MPL Board Innovation and Strategy meeting; all Trustees are welcome to attend. Informational item.

BOARD EDUCATION

5. UWM-MPL Fines Research Presentation. Director Johnson introduced Dr. Joyce Latham, former professor in the UW-Milwaukee School of Information Science. In 2018, MPL began considering ways to address potential barriers to patron use of library resources, including blocked cards due to overdue fines and fees. In 2019, Dr. Latham partnered with MPL to hold focus groups with library patrons with blocked cards to gain a better understanding of the reasons materials are not returned. Dr. Latham presented an overview of the premise, data collection methods, analysis, and final report of her fines study research project. The study has been shared with colleagues at several library conferences and will soon be published in the journal Library Trends. Dr. Latham also shared patron feedback collected at the focus groups and commended MPL for working directly with patrons to examine this issue. Director Johnson noted part of MPL's response to the findings was to reduce the overdue fine on DVDs from \$1.00 per day to \$0.15 per day. President Bria thanked Dr. Latham for sharing this research with the Board. Informational item.

NEW BUSINESS

6. Proposal for Adjustments to Unique Management Service Collection Policy. Director Johnson presented a proposal to change the parameters for referring patron accounts to the Unique Management Services (UMS) collection process; the proposal is outlined in a memo to the Board listed as Attachment C of the agenda. Trustee Kovac moved to raise the fines threshold from \$25.00 to \$99.99, lowering the referral fee from \$15.00 to \$10.00, and extending the length of time before referral from 60 days to 90 days. Trustee Mercado seconded. Motion passed.

REPORTS

- 7. Milwaukee County Federated Library System (MCFLS) Board Meeting. New Trustee Corey Clark was introduced. Director Johnson reviewed the 2020 Resource Library Report which is attached at the end of these minutes. The marketing plan was reviewed and will focus on the priority audiences of job seekers, students and parents, and lifelong learners. The Board reviewed and discussed the Wisconsin Policy Forum report *Balancing the Books*. MCFLS is in the process of hiring a new Network Administrator. Informational item.
- 8. <u>Building & Development Committee Meeting</u>. Committee Vice-Chair Nik Kovac reported on the March 4, 2021 meeting. The Committee heard proposals from the architectural firms of HGA, Moody Nolan, and TKWA. The Mitchell Street Library co-developer, Gorman & Company, placed a request with the City Assessor's office to make the library space tax-exempt. Due to the historic nature of the property, to qualify for a tax exemption the lease must be with a charitable organization that is tax-exempt under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) code. MPL does not qualify for the Section 501 exemption but the Milwaukee Public Library Foundation (MPLF) does. The developer has proposed transferring the lease to MPLF with a sub-lease to MPL. If approved, this new lease agreement would be in effect for approximately 3 years, and no material changes to the terms of the original lease. Director Johnson has discussed the request with MPLF Executive Director Ryan Daniels and the request will be presented to the MPLF Board for consideration. The Committee moves to approve the lease transfer. Trustee Kowalski seconded. Motion passed.

OLD BUSINESS

- 9. COVID-19 Response and Recovery. Director Johnson provided an update on the library's ongoing response to the pandemic and shared she has received the first of two vaccination shots. Library Administration has worked hard to get Library staff vaccinated as soon as possible and many staff have already received both shots. In the first week of March, Villard Square and Mitchell Street Library served as vaccination sites for educators. The second 'pop-up' clinic will be held in early April. MPL remains committed to assisting Milwaukee Health Department (MHD) as needed. MPL is working with Department of Employee Relations (DER) to fill vacancies and move toward reinstating more hours and services via a phased approach. Director Johnson requested approval to change the materials quarantine from 72 hours to 24 hours and to eliminate the quarantine when appropriate. Trustee Zamarripa moved to approve; Trustee Kowalski seconded. Motion passed.
- 10. State Annual Report Review Data and Ratify President's Approval. MPL prepared and submitted the annual report to the Department of Public Instruction (DPI), listed as Attachment G of the agenda. President Bria reviewed and approved the report and entertained a motion for the Board to ratify her approval. Trustee Coggs moved to ratify; Trustee Kowalski seconded. Motion passed.
- 11. 2020 Census Follow-up. Director Johnson noted MPL supported the U.S. Census Department by providing training space for census takers and applied for mini-grants to help promote taking the census. MPL hired four local mural artists to design and paint murals promoting the opportunity to be counted in the census. A series of videos were also created and distributed to various community organizations and featured local community leaders encouraging census participation. MPL had a short window to implement these programs and Director Johnson offered special thanks to Adult Programming Librarian Kristina Gomez, who became the project leader on this initiative. A letter of thanks from the Census Bureau was listed as Attachment H of the agenda. Informational item.

With no further business, the Milwaukee Public Library Board of Trustees meeting of March 23, 2021 was adjourned at 5:21 p.m.

RE: 2020 - Resource Library Annual Report

The Milwaukee Public Library (MPL) is honored to serve as the Resource Library for the Milwaukee Federated Library System, providing backup reference, consulting and other services included in the 2020-2024 Resource Library Agreement (Agreement) effective January 1, 2020.

As agreed, an annual activities dashboard report (Dashboard) has been prepared and is part of your packet today. To provide an overview of all the services we provide we have included data for Interlibrary Loan (ILL) services, which is covered under a separate agreement.

In 2020, the year that marked the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic, the most important thing libraries could do for patrons is provide digital access to resources and content, and other contactless services until it's safe to fully reinstate in-person services. In lieu of this, MPL focused on increased investments using CARES Act funding for technology and equipment for staff to provide remote services and virtual programming. MPL also increased its purchases of downloadable digital content for the Overdrive Advantage account serving Milwaukee County. Ultimately, MPL invested \$205,000 in 2020 to provide additional and more diverse content for city and county residents to meet greater demand, up by 19%.

The following summarizes additional highlights from the report:

Access to Digital Resources

The LibraryNOW library card campaign became more important than ever to support students and teachers forced into using remote learning tools since March of 2020. The MPL is helping them stay connected via their virtual MPL accounts. The program serves over 60,000 students and includes about 250 non-Milwaukee students. A detail by city is shown on the dashboard.

Visits to the MPL Digital Library & Recollection WI page were up about 40% and served 7,000 MCFLS patrons. Visits to MPL's new web page, the "MPL COVID-19 Resource Portal" is highlighted on the dashboard and shows modest usage by city and county residents.

Training and Consulting

With the exception of one session which happened virtually, the few examples from 2020 occurred in person prior to the pandemic. MPL staff provided three sessions on the LibraryNOW library card campaign, one for WLA Literary Awards and one on security. This is a significant reduction from previous years due to the suspension of in-person events during the pandemic.

Reference transactions, retrievals and circulation

There was a drop in all categories due in part to the fact that for several weeks, no services were being provided. A one-week survey (usually there are two) of in-person, phone, virtual chat and E-mail reference services indicates that MPL staff have been able to serve over 5,800 suburban residents, just under 2000 from outside the County, and about 700 out of state. Retrieval requests are received by phone and in-person for materials stored in open and

closed stacks, serving just under 400 suburban residents. MPL circulated 204,344 items to patrons who picked up their items at suburban locations. In the reverse, stats show that the number of items from the various suburban locations that were checked out at MPL locations was 112,082 items. There was virtually no change in the percentages of each between the two years. The data does not include when an item is checked out from its homebased branch.

<u>Unique Public Computer Users</u>

New this year is the metric around public computer use which all members can track. The dashboard shows modest use of MPL desktops and laptops by suburban patrons detailed by city.

Tours, Programs and Outreach



Views of MPL Programs on YouTube



2020 Resource Library Dashboard






LibraryNOW Accounts for St Elizabeth Ann Seton of West Allis


242 Total Non-Milwaukee Students by City, Including 88 West Allis Students




Unique Public Computer Users

Committee Chair Larry Miller called the MPL Board of Trustees Innovation and Strategy Committee meeting to order at 8:01 a.m. on April 14, 2021 with a quorum present. All Trustees and presenters participated by video conference.

- 1. <u>Committee Meeting Minutes Review</u>. The Committee reviewed and approved the minutes from the February 10, 2021 meeting, listed as Attachment A of the agenda.
- 2. Broadband Expansion. Library Director Joan Johnson introduced the topic of broadband expansion and discussed the increasing community need as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2020 MPL purchased an additional 250 hot spots for circulation to help address the connectivity need. MPL is now exploring long-term solutions and ways to help lead the effort to expand options for access. Kurt Kiefer, Assistant State Superintendent of the Department of Public Instruction (DPI), shared details about the agency's efforts to reduce digital equity gaps. Their work includes leveraging data in order to identify rates and types of connectivity, create policies, and advocate for resources. DPI worked with several local and national partners to collect and analyze data which was then shared with Wisconsin school districts. In addition to federal E-Rate funding, Governor Evers has earmarked state funds to address broadband access. Assistant Library Director Judy Pinger provided an update on MPL's current technology funding streams and equipment availability. MPL's participation in the E-Rate funding program has allowed the library to build tremendous infrastructure and connectivity at Central Library and the branch library locations. David Henke, City of Milwaukee Information Technology Management Department (ITMD), presented a possible technology solution that would allow the library's connectivity to extend into qualifying households in the communities surrounding MPL locations. In addition to offering connection and equipment, MPL staff would also provide instructional support for the resources. The

Director's Report April 2021

Director Johnson and team monitored progress of the bill which ultimately became The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA). As the team learned what types of projects could be funded, they began to make contacts in the community to line up potential partners and develop plans for how the MPL could make use of the funds to help expand broadband access throughout the City. Under the portion of ARPA dubbed the Emergency Connectivity Fund and worth \$7.2 billion nation-wide for up to ten years, libraries and schools are eligible to apply for equipment and services that support remote learning for students. New with this funding is the ability to purchase end-user devices such as modems, laptops and hot spots that can be used off-site in places such as households, community centers, etc. Meetings included key stakeholders such as the Mayor and his team, the City's Information Technology Management Dept. (ITMD), Milwaukee County Federated Library System (MCFLS), Dept. of Public Instruction's (DPI) Asst. Superintendent and Library Leadership Team staff, philanthropic organizations focused on digital inclusion and technology, and youth-serving organizations with facilities in target communities. In response to the opportunities presented by ARPA, Johnson participated in several supportive information sessions and discussions in peer-networking groups at the national and state level.

The MKE Responds (the city's "pandemic civic response leadership team," a public/private partnership forged between the Mayor representing the City of Milwaukee and the Greater Milwaukee Foundation) is also working on proposals for ARPA funding through the City of Milwaukee. Director Johnson regularly attends meetings and the policy brief that was presented to the Mayor included funding priorities in areas that closely overlap MPL priorities including health, education, housing & food security, and economic development. All of which are areas being featured on MPL's Covid-19 informational portal on the MPL web page.

Director Johnson appeared in a WTMJ interview that was broadcast in mid-March that highlighted the MPL's partnership with Milwaukee County Circuit Court and the Legal Aid Society of Milwaukee to bring teleconference services to four MPL branches for patrons to attend virtual court hearings. Court rooms prioritized are for cases involving evictions and family law.

MPL serves as the Resource Library for Milwaukee County Federated Library System (MCFLS) and carries out such duties as stipulated per an agreement in effect through 2024. The Library Director or her designate delivers a written and verbal report on an annual basis to the MCFLS Board highlighting services provided and related ROI data. At the same meeting, Director Johnson briefed the MCFLS Board on the "Balancing the Book" recommendations from the MPL Financial Sustainability Task Force and next steps.

Director Johnson convened the MPL Scholarship Committee comprised of board members from each of the three volunteer boards that support the MPL. The group of five adjudicated applications from MPL staff members representing multiple classifications who are currently enrolled in library school or other educational programs. Nine awards in varying amounts were issued to help fund students for spring or summer semesters. Awards are offered twice a year to provide support year-around.

Director Johnson met with other cabinet members to gain and offer support for advancing departmental goals. This has been particularly fruitful with the Department of Employee Relations' assistance in helping MPL achieve long-term goals related to HR functions and for MPL to support city-wide goals led by the Milwaukee Health Department to increase vaccine-uptake in target communities.

MPL HELPS PEOPLE READ

<u>Milwaukee Must Reads</u> – The Milwaukee Public Library and Menomonee Valley Partners book club series wrapped up on March 16 with *Good Time Party Girl: The Notorious Life of Dirty Helen Cromwell*. The twelve attendees were given behind-the-scenes information about the updated version of the book by Feral House Publishing VP and Milwaukee's own Christina Ward. Over 45 patrons attended the book club series started in January of 2021.

MPL Book Chat. Carmen Murguia, a local author, poet, and educator joined Book Chat in March to discuss her works and share some of her favorite books. Carmen is a graduate of the prestigious Loft Literary Center's "Inroads: Latino/Chicano Writers Program" in Minneapolis, MN and conducts workshops on "Finding Your Voice," "Navigating Life After the Closet," and "The Intersections of Culture & Identity." Carmen is recognized as one of "50 People You Should Know" by Milwaukee Magazine. Carmen is well-known to MPL as she likes to go to all of the libraries. Attendance: 14

<u>English Reading Hour</u>. English Reading Hour is a monthly virtual program for ESL/ELL adult patrons presented by the Refugee and Immigrant Services Committee at MPL, staff that have been trained to tutor ESL/ELL students. Patrons read poems or listen to songs together in English and then interpret the meaning with the help of library staff. Patron Lanting says, "I took the reading class. I thought the poem should be difficult to read and understand, so I never tried to read them. I love to read them and read them again and again. Thank you for holding the reading class". Attendance: 8

MPL HELPS PEOPLE LEARN

English Conversation Hour. English Conversation Hour is a weekly virtual program for ESL/ELL adult patrons presented by the Refugee and Immigrant Services Committee at MPL, staff that have been trained to tutor ESL/ELL students. Since starting this program virtually last year, the program has retained and grown a devoted patron base that includes both local and international participants. Patrons engage in getting to know you conversation and activities including scavenger hunts and short lessons on basic English. The committee also just started a Pen Pal email service for participating patrons to practice English writing and comprehension. Attendance: 46 (March collective attendance)

This Woman's Work: Black Women's Economic Activism in Postwar Milwaukee.

Dr. Crystal Moten a curator at the Smithsonian National Museum of American History discussed her research on Black women's economic activism in Milwaukee. With compelling examples of primary resources Dr. Moten illustrated how Black women asserted their rights in the workplace to combat racial and gender oppression. The focus of this presentation on Black women served to deepen our understanding of African American's twentieth century struggle for equality and freedom. Attendance: 31

<u>Technology Tuesdays (series)</u>. This program supports the Milwaukee Public Library's strategic plan outcome of increasing digital inclusion by identifying current and future trends in all realms of technology and presenting them to library patrons in a straightforward and easy to understand manner. Patrons continue to increase their knowledge of computer hardware, the different ways technology can be used to enhance day-to-day life, and how to take part in different forms of online content creation. Specifically, in March the programs covered the following topics: Android Auto and Apple CarPlay, Cutting the Cord, Your Laptop Tour, Listening and Subscribing to Podcasts, and Podcasting 101. The program is also very popular for asynchronous program participation, with March recordings receiving over 85 views this month. Attendance: 81



Elizabeth talked about the environmental and fiscal contributions that solar power affords as well as solar group-buy programs and solar jobs for residents. Attendance: 22


MPL HELPS PEOPLE CONNECT


Patron Visits


