Six Skills for Early Literacy

Each book on this list will help teach one or more of the Six Skills for Early Literacy. Look for the corresponding colored dots following each title listed to see which skills are emphasized in that book.

***Print motivation**

Being excited about and interested in books

- Share books that excite children's interests
- Re-read favorite books and rhymes
- Have fun and enjoy books together

*Phonological awareness

Playing with the sounds in words

- Sing songs
- Play word games: clap syllables, substitute sounds, drop letters (i.e. train becomes rain)
- Share rhymes

***Enriched vocabulary**

Knowing the specific names of things.

- Be descriptive when naming things: big red boat, furry black puppy
- * Expose children to new words
- * Discuss concepts: time, seasons, opposites, etc.

*Narrative skills

Telling stories and describing things

- # Engage in conversations: model good listening skills
- Allow children to tell their own stories
- Encourage pretend play

***Print awareness**

Noticing print everywhere, knowing how to handle a book, and following words on a page


- Help children discover letters and words on signs, menus, labels, etc.
- Allow children to hold books and turn pages
- Follow the words on a page: demonstrate left to right/ top to bottom

***Letter knowledge**

Knowing the differences between how letters look, their names, and their sounds


- # Help identify the first letter of their name
- Introduce the letters of the alphabet
- Make children aware that letters have different sounds

A mischievous gorilla has swiped the Zookeeper's keys. Now all the animals in the zoo are trying to sleep in the house instead of their beds.




Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star by Jane Cabrera. PIC CABRERA. **
Sing this story out loud! This nursery rhyme is expanded with bright, colorful, bold illustrations of baby animals from around the world.




Now I'm Big by Karen Katz. PIC KATZ.

Tiny little frog learns how to get away, "Jump, frog, jump!" from almost every animal except one. Will he jump away in the end?




Underground by Denise Fleming. PIC FLEMING. ★ ★

Trapani takes a traditional song and adds her own unique style creating an exploration of the seasons as well as the five senses.




Farmyard Beat by Lindsey Craig; illustrated by Marc Tolon Brown. PIC CRAIG. **

Dinosaur vs. the Library by Bob Shea. PIC SHEA.


Rambunctious Dinosaur loves to be noisy and roar with his friends, but will he be able to keep it in during library story time?
