After the death of his brother, King spends his afternoons searching for dragonflies. But when his former best friend goes missing, he must confront his own buried secrets.



The Total Eclipse of Nestor Lopez by Adrianna Cuevas. Ages 8-12.

Tired of moving around, Nestor is happy to move in with his abuela--until a witch threatens his new home.

Shannon Hale; illustrated by Victoria Ying. Ages 8-12. Follow the adventures of the lonely and awkward Diana from Themyscira, who would go on to become Wonder Woman.







Clean Getaway by Nic Stone. Ages 8-12. Scoob learns truths about himself and the world on a wild road trip through the American South with his beloved G'ma.


Everything Comes Next: Collected & New Poems by Naomi Shihab Nye. Ages 9-12.



Young People's Poet Laureate Naomi Shihab Nye shares personal poems about


her father's life in Jerusalem and her own childhood.


Teen Reads: Ages 13-18
